# ONE SHOW AT A TIME

Sharing in the CleanPoudreXperience

As a newcomer to the clean and sober life and a longtime member of the Grateful Dead community, I was thrilled to learn that the Wharf Rats table would be accompanying Dark Star Orchestra when they played in my hometown of Fort Collins, Colorado. With my good friend and fellow in recovery, Lee, manning the table and in need of assistance, I was also excited to be presented with an opportunity to provide some valuable service and to be part of a wonderful community of love, hope, and support! My love for music and my awareness of the healing power of music has been an important part of my life for a long time. I have now begun a program of recovery from addiction and alcoholism, but I am unwilling to lose the experience of seeing live music, even if that means I have to occasion venues and establishments that serve booze and be surrounded by likely drug users. In fact, the power that music possesses to heal in my life brings me a new importance and appreciation for it while in recovery.

In discussions in and outside of meetings and with fellow recovering drunks and addicts, the topic of how to handle attending events where alcohol is served has come up a number of times. Three major points I have learned about this are to make sure I am on a solid spiritual foundation at the outset, make sure I am going for the right reasons, and, if possible, be surrounded by some sort of sober support or fellowship. Finally, it is always a good idea to consider ways in which you can be of service in these settings. My spiritual foundation is an ongoing process of discovery for me and my higher power. With the love, guidance, and support of my sponsor, as well all the wonderful brothers and sisters I have met in recovery, I am excited about my ongoing journey of spiritual awakening. Suffice it to say that the magic of live music is a fantastic conduit for my personal realization of a power greater than me. Now, in sobriety, I can finally more fully realize this!

At the previously mentioned DSO show there is no doubt that my Higher Power was both looking out for me and, by His will, paving a path in front of me; one I am so hopeful will provide an opportunity to continue to be of service to

others seeking hope and support in this music scene we love. As set break approached at Dark Star, I found myself pondering the potential for a halftime meeting at this particular show. Certainly back in the day at a 20,000+ Grateful Dead show, or even a 5 or 6 thousand person show...or a Phellowship or Gateway meeting at a big Phish or Panic show...there would be a crowd of clean and sober folks showing up. But a few hundred peeps at a small theater in Fort Collins? I wasn't so sure. Well, including Lee and myself, we had a wonderful little set-break fellowship of about 8 people. It was awesome! Topics like how awesome the music experience is sober and excitement about the upcoming summer music and festival season dominated the discussion.

A couple times mention was made about anticipating the upcoming season at our legendary local outdoor venue The Mishawaka Inn and Amphitheater. The "Mish" is an amazing place to see live music! Nestled in right beside the river in the gorgeous and majestic Poudre Canyon, it is nothing short of magical. I have personally been attending shows there for about fifteen years. Memories that stand out include an awesome Ratdog show, a couple String Cheese shows, a fantastic two night Moe run, countless Leftover Salmon and Yonder Mountain String Band gigs, some amazing bluegrass festivals, and the list goes on and on... As mention was made of this summer at Mishawaka, a light bulb popped on in my head. Wouldn't it be cool if Mishawaka had a clean and sober support table and group for all or most of its summer schedule? After the meeting, as Dark Star was tuning up for a second set, I turned to Lee and said this. He responded that he was thinking the exact same thing!

Not surprisingly, over the years a few "dark clouds" have passed over the Mish related to substance abuse. None have been dark enough, however, to cloud the magic of the music and natural beauty that are the essential Mishawaka experience. It just so happens that new ownership has taken over for this concert season. The new owners are excited and looking for all kinds of ways to breathe fresh air into the Mish experience. After Lee made initial contact with Dani, the new proprietor, response to our idea was very positive. Just last Saturday, after a gorgeous day of hiking in the canyon and relaxing by the river, we had the chance to meet with Dani and discuss in person the initial plan for the CleanPoudreXperience sober support group at Mishawaka this summer. Thanks for the box of stickers, Bill! We will put them to good use. She loved them. And she loves our plan. Two weekends from now, the Waterfront Music Festival kicks off the season at Mish, and we intend to be there in full swing.

Much like the Wharf Rats and 'spin-off' support groups for other bands, we want to make ourselves available to anyone who thinks we have something to offer. We are not affiliating with AA or NA or any 12 step recovery, and we have no desire to tell anyone else how to enjoy their show. We want to provide that same kind of support, information, and fellowship.

It is our hope at Mishawaka to provide a focus and emphasis on the healthy and safe enjoyment of this beautiful scene. We seek to share in an appreciation of the stunning natural beauty of this canyon and the wonderful opportunity that this venue provides to enjoy music and fellowship in such magnificent surroundings. We also wish to share in a common bond of celebration surrounding the joy of music and the fun of dancing and communing together. We additionally are considering the possibility

of providing a model for venue specific sober support groups. This feels especially relevant for me at venues that hold such a special place in people's hearts and the legendary status that a place like Mishawaka holds for me.

Some highlights of this summer's schedule for me include two nights of Leftover Salmon in June, Hot Tuna, two nights of Dark Star, and two nights of Keller Williams in August. I have written previously for the WR Newsletter over the years - mostly sharing my finding the WR table at Shoreline Ampitheatre in Mt. View CA back in the late 80s. Reading the copies of the Newsletters (I have many) and keeping in touch with many of the folks over a few years. Knowing that those folks were there and that there was a meeting involved during the show and also getting to know others who did not drink or use drugs was even more of a boost in sobriety for me. I was told at my AA meetings that I needed to quit listening to that "acid rock" and quit wearing tie dye among a variety of "suggestions" during my early sobriety. However, I decided after talking to a few "sober outlaws" and reading the page in the BB that states that if you want to go somewhere considered slippery to do a check on why and where and who, etc and if I felt strong and safe that I could go anywhere I chose. So along with my AA friend we began to test the waters - go to meetings and keep our spiritual sobriety strong - then go out and listen to live music and dance and do some of the things we loved and learn to do them sober. Therefore when I found out about the WRs at my first sober show in 1987 - Eugene Or - I looked for them in 1990 at Shoreline. And the same remains today - Whenever I want to go anywhere that may be a bit slippery - I do my personal check - if I check out ok -then I go and I also know either someone to meet there or take with me. I even have those I call "hostages" who may not particularly love the GD or Jam bands - but they go with me cause I bribe them with a really great time and other fun stuff!!!! My first sober show in OR - I took someone who loved Dylan and he was opening for the Dead!!! (My Lonnie is an old 80s Disco fan (: and when there are shows in Eugene - he gets to camp out at the local hot springs) So for those just coming to and wanting to stay connected with your music and most of your lifestyle - find a show or wherever to attend and take along a hostage or two and as soon as you get there - find the yellow balloons and folks who enjoy being clean and clear and wanting to help others get thru an awesome show without getting high. STAY HIGH ON MUSIC and your life will change drastically!!!!!!!!! Signing onto the WR list and keeping in touch throughout the year is a huge boost for those wanting to stay connected to the music, recovery and form lasting friendships.

I wrote an article that will be published next month, I was asked to be part of a healing convention near here, I was asked to speak at another expo on healing & now I am editing a newsletter about healthy homes. I feel I came a long way from the self destruction behavior I used to have.
